Armstrong had been appointed as a sect archivist to aid in the production of a biography of Hubbard. The 14,000 documents, sealed by the courts since 1982, include letters from Hubbard to his various wives and family members, photographs, an unpublished book manuscript "and just oodles of stuff," Mrs. Hubbard testified.

Yet Flynn contends the documents can prove Hubbard systematically victimized tens of thou-sands of Scientologist by misrepresenting himself (Please see \* **TRIAL**, next page
